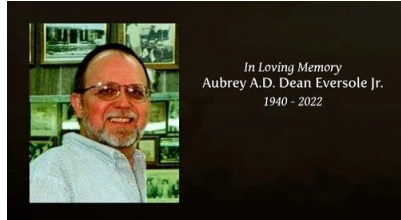

“ *I first met AD in his barbershop in the late 1970's when I moved to Houston to start a new job and bought a house in Fairchilds on FM 361. I became a "regular" and he would honk as he passed my house on his way to the deer lease. Over the years he cut four generations of my family's hair. Starting with my father, then mine, then my two sons and he then gave my three grandsons their first haircuts. It was such an event that my daughter-on-law's father drove all the way in from Weimer to attend the appointment and get his "sample". He also cut my father-in-law's hair for many years after he moved to Houston. They both had been impacted by polio as young men and shared their stories during each cutting. AD was also the only shop that knew how to give a true flat top haircut. Anyone that went to the shop will remember the stories and friendly banter among the patrons as they waited in line for a haircut. Colt joined his grandfather at the shop several years ago and he has been cutting my hair since then as AD started to limit his time standing behind the chair.
